STUDENT SATISFACTION FEEDBACK SURVEY 2023-24

As part of a process improvement initiative, the IQAC of Shri Lal Bahadur Shastri Degree College, Gonda, conducted a student satisfaction survey in March 2023-24. This survey aims to track changes over the years in various aspects of student satisfaction. This report summarizes the results and compares them with the previous year's survey findings.

Objectives

- To measure students' level of satisfaction with the college as a whole, and with its different processes.
- To evaluate the effect of changes initiated this year on student satisfaction with the process.
- To identify existing problems, if any, and recommend changes.
- To identify changes in student satisfaction with various processes, as compared with previous surveys.

Methods and tools

The Student Satisfaction Feedback Survey was prepared using, in general, the same guidelines adopted for previous similar surveys (Appendix). The 30 survey questions have been developed in light of existing college practices. A comment box has been provided for students to add any relevant written comments on learning and teaching at the college. The expectation is that college will retain this open text data and use it for their own analysis.

The Survey included the following components:

- Global items measuring students' overall satisfaction with the process.
- Items soliciting student opinion and perception of the quality of the programs, classrooms and laboratories.
- Items soliciting student opinion and perception of the Syllabus and Examination process.
- Items soliciting student opinion and perception of the Teaching environment and material.
- Items soliciting student opinion and perception of the Infrastructure and maintenance.

The total number of students enrolled in graduate and postgraduate courses for the 2021-22 academic year is 8907. 900 undergraduate and Post-graduate students from all classes, or 10% of the total enrolment for the 2023-24 academic year, made up the first sample. We conducted the study using cluster and easy sampling approaches. The data from 2023-24 is summarized in the following tables. The number of students enrolled in the 2023-24 academic year was 8907. As a result, we have taken an approximation of 900 students.



Data Analysis and interpretation



The interpretations are as follows as per the questions given-



Results & Conclusions

Student Feedback Analysis Report

Two surveys were conducted to gather student feedback on various aspects of the college, including campus facilities, faculty cooperation, and the syllabus design and review. The first survey utilized a structured questionnaire comprising 30 questions that addressed faculty cooperation, campus facilities, and other related factors. The results were analyzed using graphs and charts, revealing the following insights:

- Over 70% of students agreed that the entire course was completed on time, and teachers were available and accessible after lectures.

- More than 59% of students reported that teachers conducted their lectures punctually and regularly, were well-prepared, and excelled in both content delivery and teaching style.

- Over 41% of students acknowledged the provision of material inputs, encouragement of student participation, and the availability of basic physical resources in playgrounds and laboratories, as well as books and amenities in the library.

- Approximately 53% of students agreed that teachers were friendly, helpful, and utilized modern teaching techniques. They also noted that teachers maintained attendance records, guided students in their holistic development, enhanced their knowledge and skills, and provided regular and timely feedback on their performance.

- More than 54% of students expressed satisfaction with the cooperation and support of the library staff, grievance cell, and disciplinary committee.

Curriculum Feedback and Recommendations

The feedback from students across various disciplines regarding the curriculum has been consolidated, resulting in the following recommendations:

- Interdisciplinary courses should be included in the curriculum.

- Mini projects and case studies could be introduced to deepen students' knowledge.

- Video lectures, tutorials, and e-content should be provided to facilitate learning at any time and from any place.

- The institution could offer more diploma, certificate, skill-oriented, and job-oriented courses.

- Students should be encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities on weekends, and their life skills should be further developed.

- Sports students should be motivated, and their talents should be showcased.

The Institutional Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) analyzed the feedback from all programs and discussed the notable suggestions during the IQAC meeting for further action.
